From the Curate

'A man that looks on glasse
On it may stay his eye;
Or, if he pleaseth, through it passe,
And then the heav'n espie'

When George Herbert wrote these words, he had in mind the stained glass of many country churches in his day. The tumults of the Reformation had changed the character of parish worship, yet the vivid images of saints and martyrs etched into church windows were often retained. Such images were more than pleasing adornment: they enacted a visual transformation in paraphrase of the soul. As the light behind them shifted, grew bright, and dimmed with the passage of day and season, so the figures they depicted came alive, and seemed to play out their hallowed story. And what the lively, ambulant glory of stained glass manifested, was a new way of seeing: beyond the images themselves, the mind was brought to rest upon their mysterious illumination. Through the stories they depicted came the dawning awareness of the radiance of God, 'For with Thee is the fountain of life', says the psalmist, and 'in Thy light shall we see light'. Herbert agrees, but points us in the opposite direction: look at the vivid glory of holy lives, he says, and through them discern the unfailing constancy of God. 'Teach me, my God and King, in all things Thee to see...'

Well, that isn't easy. God may be constant, after all, but mortal life is full of change and chance. The stained glass which sparked Herbert's verse soon enough sparked the ire of Puritan iconoclasts, who smashed and slashed the images they regarded as idolatrous, guilty of trading the infinite glory of the unseen God for the corruptible worth of material craft. In the

seventeenth century, East Anglia bore the brunt of furious destruction at the hands of those who sought drastic reform. What on earth did they prove? Perhaps only that religion is at its worst when it acts, out of its own fears and suspicions, with brutality and a desire to coerce. Mercifully, even amidst untold carnage, much survived.

Yet even if our parish churches now contain, in the most part, clear glass, Herbert's poem retains its power, for it gestures towards something far more fundamental: namely, human lives, transfigured by the love of God, blazing with divine radiance in the quiet, ordinary rhythms of life.

'All may of Thee partake: Nothing can be so mean Which with his tincture - for Thy sake Will not grow bright and clean.'

Herbert is so convincing, so persuasive, because he is so clearly in love with God in the lives of the folk he serves as a priest. God, for Herbert, is invisible. Yet God has a face, too: the face of Christ played out in the love and kindness of ordinary souls.

Recently, I sat watching the light change in one of our churches, contemplating the blessing and privilege of my time here as your Curate. I face the future with great excitement, as I face my leaving here with terrible heartache. But mostly there abides in me a profound gratitude, that through your love, kindness, generosity and faithful joy, I have so many times the heav'n espied. Thank you.

Gardening Club

Those few gardeners who haven't kept up with the weeding this spring now have an answer to any criticism. That growing patch of nettles behind the compost heap, those dandelions flowering in the lawn, the ground elder spreading under the shrubs are simply - REWILDING.

These invaders, welcome or not, do provide flowers for the pollinators and their leaves food for butterflies and moths. Young nettle leaves host caterpillars of butterflies including red admiral and peacock. Garlic mustard, or jack-by-the-hedge, is used by the orange tip butterfly.

They can also be used in the kitchen. Nettle tips make a tasty nutritious soup cooked with potato and chicken stock. Dandelion flowers make wine or can be scattered in salads. Ground elder and Jack by the hedge leaves can add favours to salads.

Over a century ago many of our 'weeds' would have added variety to the limited diet of the countryside at the time.

Weeds may be hard to spot in the Neatishead gardens our members plan to visit in June. Two quite different gardens, but both filled with lots to interest - and envy! There will be a glass of wine and nibbles to end what should, if the weather is kind, be a lovely evening.

Our visit to the Rosary Cemetery,

which covers an area of 13 acres, between Rosary Road and Telegraph Lane in Norwich took place on a glorious spring afternoon and our guide gave us a fascinating insight into the lives of many notable and interesting people of Norfolk who have been buried there over the last two centuries: David Prior (Engine Driver) and James Light (Fireman) who both died tragically in the Thorpe Railway Disaster on 10th September 1874; Edward Boardman, founder of the architectural firm Boardman and Son in 1860; Edward Hines who founded an ironworks in Norwich in 1820: Robert Webster first Chairman and one of the founders of Norwich City FC, as well as members of the Jarrold and Colman families, to mention just a few. The cemetery with its impressive monuments and simple headstones overlooks the



city. It is unusual being set out in tiers on hillside and is a haven for wildlife among the tree lined avenues and footpaths (see photo). We were

pleased that our guide was able to take us to the grave of Rev John Gunn (, who I mentioned in last month's NIB, Rector of Irstead and Vicar of Barton Turf who died in 1890. There will be a small display about Rev John Gunn and his father Rev William Gunn at the Community Market this month as well as photos from our Rosary Cemetery visit.

Weather


April and May continue a very wet and cool spring.

April's monthly total was 77.6mms / 3.06in which is 172% of average, so another very wet month. The highest daily total was 14.8mms / 0.58in recorded on the 23rd. The highest daytime temperature was 18.4'C on the 29th.

May's monthly total to date (up to 19th) is 54.4mms / 2.14in and already above the monthly average again. The highest daily total so far is 24.0mms / 0.94in on the 9th and rain fell on 9 consecutive days between the 4th and 12th. The highest daily maximum recorded so far is 23'C on the 7th and the lowest overnight temperature to date is 0.1'C on 2/3rd.

Temperatures overall have been about average but with typically marked diurnal fluctuations at this time of year.

Wildlife Notes

damp cold weather with predominantly northerly winds which experienced in early May has had a large effect on wildlife and as I write these notes in mid-month we are still only just seeing our first damselflies and dragonflies. Some of our avian summer visitors are only just reaching us and there seems to be a lack of birds in general. Hopefully this will improve with some warmer weather but already my Blue Tits have given up on their nest in the bat box and I have heard from other residents who have had none in their nest boxes either.

Having started on a pessimistic note it is pleasing to note that the Alderfen Great Crested Grebes



had four stripy chicks last week and I have seen family groups of young Long Tailed Tits today.

The Common Terns at Barton Broad arrived in

reasonable numbers but as yet have not ousted the Cormorants from their nesting platform so are yet to start nesting. Talking of Terns, a

recent visitor to Hickling and Potter Heigham marshes is a Caspian Tern which is the largest tern in the world and is more commonly found in America. It has a very large orange coloured beak which some birders describe as looking like a carrot. Like our Common terns it is a fish eater and dives into the water to catch its prey but can presumably manage to catch bigger fish than ours do. Unlike our terns it does not have long tail streamers and has dark coloured legs.

Those of you who follow the local media may have heard that a male Osprey has been investigating the new nesting platform at Ranworth and there are hopes that it will be joined by the female who spent the summer in the broads last year. Nesting Ospreys in the Broads – something else for the anglers to moan about as it is another fish-eating bird and tends to take larger specimens. Sadly, it appears that the wet weather likely caused the failure of the peregrines nesting on Norwich cathedral this spring as all

three chicks died but there is better news from Cromer church tower where they are still thriving.

In June we should be seeing our first Swallowtail

butterflies and Norfolk Hawker dragonflies, both species which I had already recorded by mid-May last year due to the warmer

Neatishead Parish Council

Did you know that the parish council receives money for the recycling collected in the bins in the village hall car park? The amount is dependent on the weight of the collections and the money is then spent on helping the council look after the village. So, if you have any mixed glass bottles or jars, paper or textiles then please make use of the bins provided as this will ultimately help the council invest back into the village.

The parish council had requested for the permissive footpath that runs along the field edge from the top of Street Hill down to the New Victory Hall to be available to provide a safe walkway for villagers and visitors to enjoy, which the landowner kindly agreed to. For it to remain open, it is really important that this path is used correctly and in accordance with the signs displayed. The path is not a bridle path and should not be used by horses. A barrier has been put up to guide users where the path lies and the area that should not be walked on and the council would like to thank you for your cooperation with this.

The restoration of the staithe after the works completed by the Broads Authority is ongoing. The reseeded grass area will take a while to become established and the flooding around the bench in heavy rain is being addressed. Funding for a piece of play equipment is currently being applied for so thank you for your patience whilst this work continues.
