

From the Curate

When I was a small boy, I reached the conclusion that I should like to be The King. Just imagine (I thought to myself) how agreeable it would be to make a cup of tea in the small galley kitchen in Buckingham Palace, watching the world bustle past one's windows...

Well, my childhood felt the bump of reality at several points, but the impact was never more bruising than the moment in which I made the twofold discovery that (1) Buckingham Palace does not possess a small galley kitchen, and (2) being The King wasn't the sort of thing for which one applied (at least not any more – I suppose one *could* say that William the Conqueror did, rather forcefully). I felt very glum about this for about a week, before the lure of being an airline pilot comforted me in my grief. Not that that ever really took off.

Childhood misapprehensions aside. the monarchy as we know it today is a curious balance. The Greek words which make it up monos, 'one, single'; arkho, 'to lead, rule' - echo the language of power and hierarchy which our modern democracy at least nominally disavows. Curiously enough, modern unease finds a soulmate in much of the Hebrew Bible. 'Give us a king to judge us', say the Israelites to the Prophet Samuel, who replies with a dire warning, listing the various evils into which human rulers are prone to slide. Thousands of years later, Lord Acton would distil them all into a pithy phrase: 'power tends to corrupt, and absolute power corrupts absolutely'. So really, who wants a king?

Well, I suppose it all depends on what one means by 'power'. The modern constitutional monarch has very little in common with an *ancien regime* despot. King Charles is sovereign (a word whose meaning has changed quite a lot over time), but also a public servant. Following the example of his mother, the late Queen, his whole life has been dedicated to duty. We look to our monarch not in fear and trembling, but as a model of service. And the institutions which surround the modern monarchy embed it in laws made and amended through democratic process.

Perhaps most intriguingly of all then, it is the most ancient rite in the coronation service which makes this 'servant leadership' most visible. During the ceremony, King Charles will be anointed. The oil used has been taken from the trees which dot the Mount of Olives to the east of Jerusalem. That of course was the place from which Jesus, riding upon a donkey, echoed and transformed the image of the triumphant king, riding into his city. For Jesus took up the mantle of kingship in order to lay his life down for others. His rule took the form of love, offered unwaveringly into the depths of the world's pain. In Christ we see true power: not human coercion, but God's reconciling peace. Who would choose such a mantle? Perhaps it's just as well most of us can't. But what we can do. whatever we think about modern monarchs, is to pray for our King, that his life will show forth and stir up precisely the powerful love which we celebrate in the one we hail as the King of Kings, our Lord and God.

Neatishead, Irstead and Barton Turf Community Heritage Group

A fascinating presentation last month

by Dr Ian Hinton of the Norfolk Historic Buildings Group took us on a tour around some of the Broadland Medieval Churches of which there are 100 active and 34 redundant in the area from the smallest in Barnby near Beccles to the largest in Martham. Instead of a presentation this month, we are organising a guided visit to The Rosary Cemetery in Norwich on **Sunday 14**th **May**. This was the first non-denominational cemetery in the UK which opened in 1820 and can be found tucked away near Ketts Hill. Among the graves of many notable Norfolk people, we hope to find that

of the Revd John Gunn, Rector of Irstead and Vicar of Barton Turf from 1829 to 1869. John, born in Irstead in 1801, was one of the six children of the Revd William Gunn and Anne Mack. When his father resigned the livings of Irstead and Barton Turf

they were passed to him by Bishop Bathurst of Norwich. One of John Gunn's great leisure interests was in the Natural Sciences, especially the local geology of Norfolk. Nearly one hundred vears before it became accepted Gunn put forward the idea that the origin of the Broads were man-made by peat digging. He was a founding member and first President of the Norwich Geological Society. Resigning his Ministry in 1869, shortly after the death of his first wife Harriet Gunn (née Turner), who is buried at Irstead Church, he continued with his geological studies in his retirement. He died in 1890 and is buried at the Rosary Cemetery alongside his second wife Elizabeth Gunn, who died in 1922, but a large memorial to him can be found in Irstead Church. Weather

Exceptionally wet March but April closer to average.

March's monthly total of a huge 105.2mms/4.14in which is over twice the monthly average making up for the negligible rainfall in February. The highest daily total was 16.8mms/0.66in on the 9th and there were only 4 dry days. It was the wettest March for 42 years in England.

The lowest daytime temperature was 4.8'C on the 10th when a strong North-Easterly brought hail and snow showers with a light covering in places.

The highest daytime temperature was a warm 18.2'C on the 30th.

April's recorded rainfall to date (up to 19th) is a healthy 45.6mms/1.8in and already reaching the monthly average. With further rain forecast in the next 10 days, we will see another above average monthly total. The highest daily total so far is 11.2mms/0.44in on the 1st which is also when our lowest daily maximum temperature of 7.8'C was recorded. The highest daily maximum recorded so far is 15.8'C on the 16th and the lowest overnight temperature is -3.2'C on 3/4th.

Wildlife Notes

The good news is that the garden Blue Tits have started making a nest in a box on the garage wall. The bad news is that it is inside a bat box which is, and has been for years, situated just above and to the right of my camera nestbox. Whilst I can see the birds taking beakfulls of grass and moss into the box I won't be able to

watch the progress of the nest as eggs are laid and chicks hatch. I feel a little sad as it's the first time my camera box has been ignored and I shall miss watching them.

Just after I had written my notes for the last edition of NIB the UK saw an invasion of Alpine Swifts. These birds migrate from West Africa to southern Europe to breed but do not usually reach Britain other than on rare occasions when individual birds are seen, usually no more than two or three birds a year. This year it appears that a funnel of south westerly winds has pushed the birds towards us and groups of up to 9 have been recorded together in Ireland.

Alpine swifts are bigger than our usual swifts and have a distinctive white belly and throat so are quite different from the all brown common swifts who we will welcome back this month. Individual Alpine swifts have been seen at Cromer, Sheringham and Mundesley this spring with one bird roosting at night on Cromer church tower. As I write these notes in mid-April, Britain has seen another invasion of birds, this time Black-Crowned Night Herons, with 33 birds recorded in Britain, although none so far in Norfolk. It is thought that severe droughts in parts of France and Spain may have pushed these birds away from their normal habitats.

May is the best month to get out and see wildlife so make the most of warm days to see the first damselflies and to enjoy the spring flowers, especially the Bluebells. There is a tiny micromoth called the Bluebell Conch (Hysterophora maculosana) which has been

spreading through Britain and was first recorded in Norfolk in recent times in 2012 although there are a couple of pre 1900 records. You may find it in May and June where Bluebells thrive because its caterpillars feed inside the plants' seed capsules. It is a member of the Tortrix family and the moth is a mixture of white and black with some blue and brown markings.

Finally, my usual reminder at this time of year to please keep your dogs on leads when walking in the countryside as the ground nesting birds are easily disturbed.

Barton Wildlife Working Party

We are a group of wildlife enthusiasts who meet monthly

to maintain habitats on Barton Common to promote species diversity. On Saturday 25th March, eleven of us spent 2 hours marking out paths, creating wildlife log piles and working on pond management. Paths will enable access for everyone to see the development of new habitats. the colonisation of new species and access for groups of school pupils to carry out pond dipping. Wildlife log piles will increase biodiversity on the common by giving home, food sources, shelter, and hibernacula to the smaller species. As the logs decay, they will provide a damp environment for a wide range of fungi and mosses. Pond management by removing willow saplings on pond edges will maintain light levels. Higher light levels in the pond are not only essential for photosynthesis which provides food and oxygen, but also helps maintain higher temperatures needed for breeding amphibians.

Thanks to everyone that helped. There was a great sense of camaraderie and community spirit, resulting in an unexpected competition to produce the biggest and most unconventional wildlife log pile! If you would like to join us, then please contact me by email. There is no expectation that everyone turns up every month.


