What does it require to live a good life?

The Church has recently commenced the holy season of Lent. Christians since the earliest times have used the weeks leading up to Easter (40 days or 46 days if you include Sundays) as a time to draw closer to God by increasing their prayers, undertaking study, and committing more time to spiritual reading. Christians also use the Lenten season as a time for fasting and self-denial.

Fasting and self-denial are not overly popular activities to undertake in our modern world. Our society is heavily influenced by consumerism and materialism and we are all constantly encouraged in adverts to buy more things and to consume to excessive levels. We have all seen the adverts, whether it might be for a new car, a luxury holiday, or a new sofa. Yet in all of these different adverts the actors always look incredibly happy, the message is clear: buy this item and your life will suddenly be great and you will be really happy.

I recently read a wonderful book by the Irish author, Mark Boyle - The Way Home, Tales from a Life Without Technology. The author has spent the last ten years living in the countryside without any sort of modern technology. Mark Boyle has no smartphone, no computer, no TV.

He wrote his book the old-fashioned way - pen and paper! The author spends his time living off the land and helping his local community. The book is a joy to read and the author is incredibly happy and content; he is living a good life. He does not need any of those things that the adverts constantly tell us that we do need to be happy.

During the season of Lent Jesus calls us to reject the false message of consumerism and instead, to remember what is really needed to live a good life. To live a good life is not about buying lots of things, nor is it about eating and drinking excessively. To live a good life is about serving, caring and loving others. We only receive true joy and happiness by generously helping our neighbours and supporting our community.

'If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake, and for the sake of the gospel will save it. For what will it profit them to gain the whole world and forfeit their life? Mark 8.34-36.

Knit & Stitch

What is a 'Twiddlemuff'?



Or a sensory band as they are sometimes called? This is a familiar term for those in the crafting world but may be not for others. It is a knitted or crocheted muff with different textures and items attached to it which those suffering from dementia can fiddle with to keep their hands occupied.

People with dementia often have restless hands and like to have something to keep their hands busy so a 'Twiddlemuff' is a great source of visual, tactile and sensory stimulation, and keeps hands snug and warm at the same time. They are very easy to make and are an excellent way of using up that left over yarn or 'stash', as we in the crafting world call it, that sits around in bags taking up valuable space at home!

We have copies of patterns but a quick search on the internet will bring up patterns on both knitting groups and hospital websites. Another item I have come across recently is a marble maze - a material item containing a marble to keep restless hands occupied. Bridge Club

When people first start learning bridge, they often feel a bit out of their depth.

It is a game with several elements, each of which requires skill and practice. It's worth the effort though! Bridge is a way of freeing your mind to focus on one thing and forget about "stuff". It's a bit like fly fishing.

The basic idea is to win as many "tricks" as possible for your side. A "trick" is where each player plays a card in turn and the best card wins. The "best" card is either the highest of the suit led, or a "trump". The "trump" suit is decided in an auction at the start of each hand. There are 13 tricks to be won in a game.

The first phase of a game is the auction. The idea is to find the trump suit and number of tricks that a partnership think they can make. Each person makes a bid, starting with the dealer. A bid says what you propose as the trump suit and how many tricks you think your hand is worth. The number of tricks is how many over 6 (roughly half of 13) you think you can make. So a bid of 1 club is saying that you are proposing clubs as the trump suit and you can make 7 tricks (6 + 1).

The suits have a priority of Clubs (lowest), Diamonds, Hearts and Spades (i.e. alphabetical order) followed by No Trumps. The lowest possible bid in an auction is 1 Club and the highest is 7 No Trump (i.e. all 13 tricks with no trump suit). Each bid made must be higher than the previous bid. If you don't want to bid at this stage, you can pass.

The auction ends when there are 3 consecutive passes and the last bid becomes the Contract. So a contract of 4 Spades means that you have to make 10 (6 + 4) tricks with Spades as trumps. Needless to say, the bidding is complicated because you are trying to find the best contract which takes into account your partner's hand. The only way to communicate is through the bidding. It is even more complicated when the opponents decide that they want to join in the bidding fun as well. Everybody learns a bidding Convention that helps give special meaning to bids. Not everybody plays the same convention...

Because bridge is a competitive game, there are rules of etiquette to ensure no unpleasantness takes place at the table. You refer to your partner as "Partner", even though you may have been married to them for the past 30 years. You never comment on your opponents' bidding or play in a derogatory sense – you always say, "Well done". It is best not to comment on your own partner's bidding or play.

You may catch yourself rolling your eyes towards the heavens or thinking "You did WHAT?!" (It is considered bad form to actually verbalise this). Just think of having tea at Betty's or being in the City Stand at Carrow Road – you get the idea. 
Our next meeting on **Wednesday** 6th **March** is a presentation by Louis

Baugh entitled 'Farming – Past, Present and Future' and takes place at Neatishead School, at 7.30pm. All welcome, NIBCHG Friends free, visitors £3. I have been looking through the NIB Archive for Louis' first 'Farming Notes' which appeared in July 2002 and read as follows:

"The dry period in March and April produced the best conditions for sowing and planting crops in years. A long-established saying is 'sugar beet should meet across the rows by the Norfolk Show' and in some cases this occurred two weeks early. May and early June have been changeable and cool, good for crops, but it has made grass silage making difficult. This is the winter feed for the cows - we were lucky in choosing the two warmest days in mid-May to make ours.

As we write these notes on June 12th we wait the arrival of summer, we usually say summer is here when the spotted flycatcher, our last summer visitor, arrives. We hope it warms up soon as the preparations for the Royal Norfolk Show are in full swing. The show was lost to foot and mouth last year, so we hope to see some of you there this year. Louise and Fran Baugh, Neatishead Hall".

So nearly 22 years later, the weather continues to bring challenges for the farmer and sadly, at the moment, there are no cows at the farm. We look forward to hearing more of the changes and challenges for the farmers of 2024 at Louis' talk on 6th March. This will also be an opportunity for NIBCHG Friends to renew their membership for the coming year and for new Friends to join.

We all know that everything has been increasing in price and unfortunately this also affects the cost of running the Parish Council. Increased costs for insurance, wages, contracts, and our legally required website means we have had to take the decision to increase this year's precept from £8,085 to £10,106. This equates to an average increase of approximately 16p per week per household and will allow us to not only meet these costs but also help fund future projects.

You may ask, just what do your Parish Councillors do? Firstly, they give their time for free. In between the public meetings every 6 weeks, they work hard on your behalf. This includes managing contracts, applying for grants, organizing defibrillators, rotating the speed camera locations (in conjunction with Neatishead PC), working with the community to enhance and maintain our villages' public spaces and staithes, collecting monies from the honesty box at Barton Turf Staithe, liaising with County Council highways, reviewing planning applications, and so much more.

We are very proud of our lovely villages with their amazing community spirit and are always available to talk through any concerns a parishioner may have. Together we are looking forward to a positive 2024.

Many thanks to the amazing volunteers who joined us on Saturday 17th February. We spent a good three hours coppicing a very large hazel in the corner of the common. The hazel was taken back to base level, removed wood cut to manageable sized pieces and transported to the wildlife area. This provides light at ground level, varying the habitat through time to encourage different species to thrive, increasing biodiversity.

The cut back wood has enabled us to build up our wildlife log piles and will be used to build up pathways near Dale and Forge ponds. Fingers crossed the deer don't eat the new hazel shoots as it grows back.

Wildlife Notes



The main talking point in February was the sightings of large flocks of Starlings at dusk, firstly by residents

of Barton Turf and then later by those in Irstead Street. These flocks are known as murmurations and can comprise of many thousands of birds which put on a spectacular show, twisting and turning to form complex shapes, before finally dropping down to roost at a chosen roost site.

I am indebted to Roger Lamb for sending me a superb video clip taken at sunset on the 4th February showing the birds going to roost in some trees on his marsh at Barton Turf and I was fortunate to be able to see the display a few days later joining him at dusk.

The birds flew in from all directions in small groups at just above tree top level before meeting up and forming one much larger flock numbering several thousand birds. Just before roosting they did the most dramatic display turning and twisting into different shapes so that you could hear the swish of the wings from some distance away.

On 12th February I was contacted by Fran Baugh to report that the previous evening there had been a large Starling murmuration at Irstead Street with the birds dropping into the reed beds at How Hill.

Many of these birds will be winter visitors from northern Europe, especially Russia and Scandinavia and in the past the sheer numbers of birds could cause massive problems due to the quantities of droppings produced at the roost sites. Big cities used to attract massive flocks and in London in 1949 the sheer weight of Starlings on the hands of the clock on Big Ben stopped the clock from working.

Starling numbers have declined massively and have reduced by over 60% in the last 25 years. This is noticeable after the winter birds have gone, with only a few breeding birds locally, to the extent that they are quite unusual visitors to my garden.

Whilst starlings may not be everyone's favourite bird, being seen by some as greedy and noisy feeders, they are now red-listed as being of conservation concern.

I love the old Norfolk name for them of "Chimney Snipe" (although I am less fond of the other Norfolk name "wheezer"), and the fact that they can imitate various sounds in addition to the whistles and calls they normally produce.

Mozart was reputed to have kept one in a cage to give him inspiration. Get out and see them while they are still here in early March.

During February we have had a male Goosander and a juvenile Great Northern Diver on Barton Broad though they have both tended to stay at the Barton Turf end of the broad so good sightings have been difficult to obtain.

March will see the return of the first warblers with Chiffchaffs making their distinctive calls towards the end of the month and then followed by Blackcaps. Tune into the dawn chorus as it builds up.

Murmurations – Roger Lamb

Weather Exceptionally mild and very wet February

January - The total rainfall recorded was 63.9mms/2.52in or 116% of average.

Gales swept through the area on the 21st and 23rd and notably on the 28th in Kinlochewe, N.W. Scotland, the highest ever U.K. January temperature was recorded at 19.6°C!

February - The rainfall to date is 89.6mms/3.53in or 224% of average, so extremely wet for what is usually the driest month of the year. The highest total to date is 18.8mms/0.74in on the 18th and this latest deluge has resulted in widespread local flooding once more as already high groundwater levels are recharged. Temperatures have been exceptionally mild throughout, peaking at 17°C on the 15th.






